LST391...Coming Home

Congress Addresses the LST391 Ship Memorial

One year ago, a man named, Congressman Hall of Texas, boldly took the bull by the horns and introduced the LST391 Ship Memorial bill (HR-4519) into legislation for the LST veterans. When the Senate failed to act upon HR-4519 in late 1998, he with the assistance of Congressman McGovern of Massachusetts, in January 1999, reintroduced the LST Ship Memorial bill as HR-146.

For the next five months, these two Congressmen (and their staffs), armed with letters you wrote, worked silently convincing their colleagues of the importance of passing the LST391 Ship Memorial Bill.

With the help of Mr. Jolly, our friend the "Commodore", Congressman Spence, and a long list of too many others to mention in this small space, HR-146 and an altered language version of HR-146 have been incorporated into three additional pieces of major legislation. One on the Senate side, and two more on the House side.

In less than three weeks, our Congress has approved and passed all three of these major pieces of legislation. The LST Bill, or a version of the LST Bill was included in each one of these major pieces of legislation. S-1059 was passed in the Senate. HR-1401 and HR-973 were both passed in the House. Because S-1059 and HR-1401 are both very similar in nature, they will be sent to "Conference" and blended into one Bill.

Appointments to "Conference" committee have not yet been announced. It is strongly recommended (by those on the hill) that every WW II, and LST veteran make an effort to find out who has been appointed to the "Conference" committee, and to inform them of your desires for them NOT to remove the LST Ship Memorial language during their combining of S-1059 and HR-1401.

HR-973 was also passed by the House just yesterday. Congressman McGovern stood before his colleagues in the House and informed them that: The LST Veterans had worked very hard and very long for their LST Memorial Ship and, that they were most deserving of it. The House voiced NOT one objection to the LST391 Ship Memorial section of Bill. HR-973 will now be sent to the Senate for their approval, and then to the President for his signing into law.

Our appreciation for their contributions and efforts in getting the LST Bill where it's at today go to:

The "Lone Texas Ranger" Congressman Hall with his attitude of, "We are going to get that LST Ship".

Our "1999 Paul Revere" Congressman McGovern for his determination to "Get the message out".

Ron Pobuda and Linda Alvers for the timely TV airing of "Onto Rugged Shores" (a documentary on the LST534).

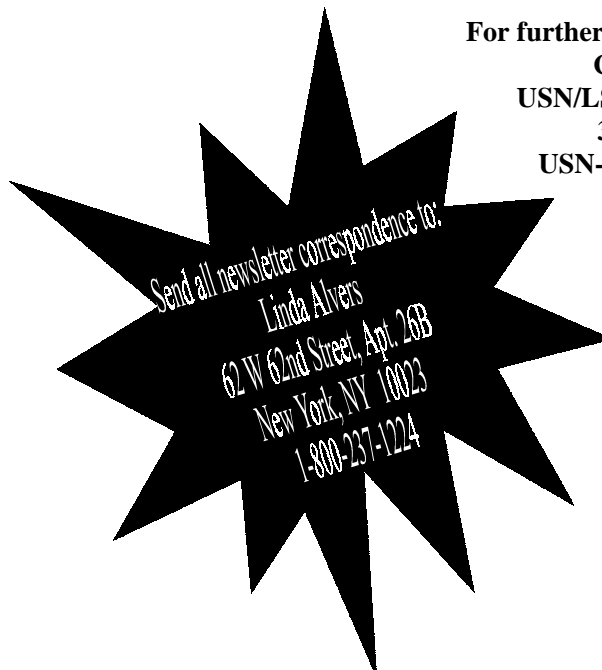
The many LST Veterans who took the time and effort to write letters and hound your representatives.

And to the many, many others on the hill that helped in their own professional (political) way.

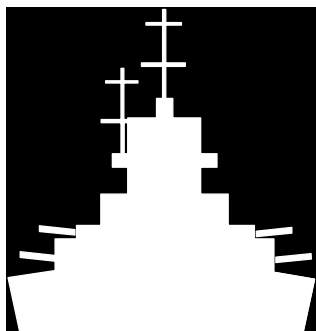
